

My name is Ramona Johnson. One Global Village, friends, and I brought a young Tibetan student to study in Tucson. I first met Tserang Dorji in 2006 at the English Training Program (ETP) for Tibetan students in Xining, China, where I was teaching English, Health, and Women's Health as a volunteer. He was 18 years old, had just graduated from high school, and was one of four students selected to attend ETP out of the 80 students in his senior high school class. He had a strong desire to learn English, but since he had no English before, I was asked to tutor him and three other students who also had no previous English. I was his tutor for a year, while he also attended his other classes in English taught by native Englishspeaking teachers in ETP. Then his father died, and he went home to be with his family and did not return to ETP. During the time I was his tutor, I came to know him as a unique student, different than the others.

He embodies the traditional values of his Tibetan Buddhist and nomad culture. His Tibetan reading and writing skills are excellent; whereas many students his age can neither read nor write Tibetan, because they had only Chinese teachers in their schools who taught in Chinese. Tserang Dorji has a creative mind, a very kind heart, and a free spirit. He is a poet, song writer, and artist. He comes from a loving family of his mother and10 children. His dream is to study abroad, then return to his hometown to have a free school for orphans and children who are poor, starting his school in a black yak-hair tent. We want to help his dream become a reality.

He tried many times since 2008 to get his Chinese passport, only to be told time after time, "We can't help you." Finally, in November 2010, a friend was able to help him get his passport. On February 14, 2010 (Valentine's Day) he passed his second visa interview and arrived in the U.S. on March 11, 2011.

Now he is enrolled in the Center for English as a Second Language at the U. of A... He is studying diligently and doing very well, except for being homesick. Once he passes the Test of English as a

Foreign Language, he will enter Pima Community College to major in Education. We are seeking financial support to help with his tuition at CESL and Pima. It is such a wonderful and rewarding kindness to invest in a student's education and in the future of Tibet. We hope you will help his dream come true. Now Tserang Dorji will tell you his story in his own words:

"My name is Tserang Dorji. I am 23 years old. I come from the boundless grassland in Tibet -a simple nomad young man. Nomads live in black tents and herd sheep, yaks, and horses. Nomad life is very hard, because they move every season, but the people are friendly and compassionate.

Why have I come to the U.S.? First, English is the most important language in the world. Second, western education is the best in the world. Third, Tibetan is the second most important language in the world. I learned Tibetan in school, and my Tibetan is very good. So here I learn both the most important language in the world and have the best education. Then I want to go back home to build a school for orphans and children who are poor.

Why do I want to build this school? Now in Tibet and China they have had big earthquakes and floods, and there are many orphans. Many orphans have been taken in by rich Chinese families who said they would treat the orphans as their own children. Unfortunately these children are often treated as their servants, cannot go to school, and are not free. Some Tibetan and Chinese families are so poor, their children also can't go to school. These children are so poor, they also aren't free.

So my dream is that I want to help these poor children and orphans have a better life and live happy and free. I can help them a little bit by building a school for them with a program teaching Tibetan, English, and Chinese. I believe the poor children and orphans will study hard and help other poor children and orphans, because they know how hard that life is. So they will help other poor children and orphans have a life that is happy and free."

Below is a brief account of how Ramona Johnson came to bring Tserang Dorji to Tucson:

Ramona had a 40-year career in Public Health Nursing, practicing and teaching, prior to her involvement with Tibet.

My Tibetan odyssey began in 1999 and 2000 when two friends brought me to hear the Dalai Lama's teachings in California. As many people do, I felt a heart connection to him, his teachings, but even more, his compassion, humility, and humor. After attending a retreat in NM, I went to Santa Fe where I met Paljor, a Tibetan, who runs Project Tibet. He was looking for volunteers to teach English in the school for nomad children which he had built in a remote part of Tibet. I was happy to become the first volunteer. In the summer of 2004, I went with him to China, where I taught English to thirty-seven children in the home of a Tibetan family. The second and third summers I taught in Paljor's Drompa Primary School with great success.

I had heard many times about an amazing American who had started an English Training Program 22 years ago for Tibetan students, located in Xining, China. I then met "Teacher Kevin" and at his request, I taught English, Health, and Women's Health at his school from 2006-2009. That is where I met Tserang Dorji, our Tibetan student. After over two years of trying, he was finally able to obtain a Chinese passport. At that point, I was able to secure him a U.S. student visa and he came to Tucson on March 11, 2011 to study."
